
Whitlingham Country Park My Work as an Assistant Countryside Ranger May 2009



Overview

WCP has a manager and 2 Countryside Rangers, and on most days, at least 2 volunteers known as ACRs - Assistant Countryside Rangers

ACRs are trained and certified in safe performance of useful tasks -

- Meeting the public who visit for recreation
- Supervising children and youngsters who may be attending for educational reasons
- Installation paths, steps, handrails, fences, benches, signage
- Maintenance repairs to these and litter picking
- Induction explains organisation and the place of volunteers within it
- First Aid
- Brush Cutter Training
- Many ACRs also train as Forest Schools Assistants Level 1 OCN

Educational Use Of Country Park

Pupils, whose ages range from 3 to 19 years, visit for "Forest Schools"




- Child-centred learning

- Set up to achieve




- Areas of social deprivation, such as
